I've always been a Pyrenees person so when my last Pyr passed four years ago, everyone assumed that someday I'd get another Pyr or that I would get a small dog. I had the great opportunity of dog sitting for some of the most wonderful Goldens and fell in love with the breed. Not that I don't also love Pyrs, always have and always will, but when I began researching the NORCAL Rescue Web site and saw all those doggies it brought me to tears nightly! At last I called and Shirlee came out to meet me soon after. The very next day, Angela called to tell me that there was a Golden who she was picking up that day. She wondered if I'd like to meet him the next day. Naturally I did! After taking him for a walk with Angela's dogs, I decided he should come home with me and so he did on January 22, 2006.

Max is a big boy, weighing almost 90 lbs. with a gorgeous red coat. He was badly matted and needed a bath, had ear infections, etc. When I brought him home, he was shaking severely. I felt so sorry for him. I took him to the vet to get his shots current and he was also treated for a long-standing ear infection in both ears. He actually whined whenever I'd pet his ear area! Poor guy really hadn't been cared for properly for sometime it seemed. The vet loved him! And, Max was really good with her. I also took him to a groomer and he got all clean and shiny!

Then I took him out to the convalescent home where my mom



lived. She adored Max and he stayed close by her wheelchair, but he growled at others in the hallways. I only took him there one more time because it seemed too dangerous. His growling continued with all strangers and sometimes with people he knew. This concerned me greatly so I contacted Angela and Shirlee about it. It wasn't possible for me to keep an aggressive dog. They asked if I'd foster him and take him to the behavioral analysis unit at the Vet Med Teaching Hospital here in Davis. I was more than happy to take him as I knew in my heart that Max was a really special guy and deserved a great home. Besides, he and I had bonded by this point so it would have broken my heart to let him go.

# A LESSON LEARNED (Rosie's Story)

Thanks to Lynn Jennings, a long-time NGRR volunteer now living in Arizona, for writing this article and to Jill Morgan and her assistant Barb for submitting it.

The morning began like any other. My beautiful 8-month-old Golden Retriever puppies began their playful rough-andtumble, and then their daily "Ring-aroundthe-Rosie" chase around the patio table in my outside courtyard. For the past 5 months, this has become a daily frisky morning exercise for my girls.

The pups were rescued from a shelter after being dropped off at an age of 12 weeks. With the intention of "just fostering" them, I went to the shelter this past June to pick them up. When I approached the kennel and saw those beautiful blond female littermates sitting so quietly on the cold, wet cement floor, my heart began to say to my head, "Uh oh, you're in trouble."

I sprung them from that awful place and began my ride home. All the way there, I thought about how I might convince my husband to keep them, as we already had two male Goldens that we rescued 2 1/2 years ago through NORCAL. I'm happy to say the pups have stayed with us since then, and we formally adopted them a few months ago.

Anyway, back to the story at hand, the morning routine was suddenly filled with the most awful sounds of the worst dog fight you've ever heard. I ran outside to the courtyard to find the two pups in what appeared to be a battle. Jumping into the middle of the fray to separate them, I realized that they were somehow connected at the collar. Rosie's collar was caught over Sandy's bottom teeth, or one of Sandy's teeth was caught on one of the buckle holes. I couldn't tell what was caught on what, but I tried frantically to release them. Nothing I could do would break them apart. The collar was the type that buckled like a belt, not the kind that you could release by pinching with two fingers. I could not get to the buckle because of the frenzy and because of how tight the collar was.

This went on for about 2 minutes. I knew I needed to do something fast as Rosie was obviously being strangled. I (Continued on page 12)

## Remembering **O'Reilly** (aka Bob)

Who would have known that when Colette Agresti asked me to evaluate her litter and asked which was "my pick," I would say, "Well, I like three, but there's just something about the one with the spiked hair that keeps staring at me. If someone drops out and he is last pick, call me."

You can imagine how surprised I was when Colette called a few days later and asked if I really wanted the puppy because someone had dropped off the list. That night I couldn't believe we were driving home with this little ball of fur . . . totally unprepared. Thank you Colette and Jack for our special boy.

His show career was very exciting. I remember his first point in the conformation ring when he was 13 months. Dale and I decided to take O'Reilly and Salsa for a test run in the ring and get a little experience before we really started showing down the line. O'Reilly had spent the night on the bed and had "pillow hair" (of course on the judge's side) and we thought, "Oh well, this is just for experience." Dale had a look of surprise and disbelief when the judge pointed to her... she thought he must have made a mistake and then she also took Winner's Bitch with Salsa... a great start for both of them.

The rest is history ... he finished fairly quickly, we took a year off to grow up and work on field and obedience, and then did his Show Dog Hall of Fame. We did only one show where we did both obedience and conformation at the same time . . . big mistake. He had been with his handler for the weekend, so he hadn't seen his Mama for a couple of days . . . I had to grab him as soon as he finished in breed and run to obedience with no warmup (considering my handling skills, not a good idea).

He was so revved-up that on the off-lead slow I could hear his jaws clamping and he bounced

around in front of me and was heeling backwards until normal pace was resumed and he bounced around back into heel position . . . on the come, I could see him

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leaning w-a-y forward and I just whispered "come" and he came like a bullet. I closed my eyes as he came screeching in and bounced off my legs... and I remember his last Utility leg when Mary made me get to the show early to work on a problem area. On the last go-out my knees were knocking together and I could barely raise my arm . . . but he did it with his jaw starting his prebarking clamping. Plus, she patiently trained the two of us for our field work ... I was the toughest to train. She showed him for two of his JH legs and his WCX because of my work schedule at the time.

For his last JH leg he hadn't trained



for a while, but I entered him anyway. He finished his Show Dog Hall of Fame on one day and the next day I took him to the test.

His last mark was a long run to a ditch and the bird was on the other side. He ran out and we saw him stop at the edge of the ditch and pick something up (the judges said, "Did he pick something up?")... his conformation handler used a stick to bait and to play with him in the ring. I knew what he picked up! He looked at me and must have received the "you're in BIG trouble if you bring me back a stick" look. He spit out the stick, got the bird, and returned. He always made me laugh even when he was naughty.

Then at the young age of 11 (after utility) he started tracking. He was trained by Debi Best, who has the patience of a saint because he was such a clown and not getting down to business. So we sent him off to relatives, Terry and Steve Southard, for the finishing touches. He loved living with them and his "harem" as Terry called the girls. Mission accomplished, he got his TD! We would never have gotten all the titles without the encouragement, training, and support of my friends . . . so it goes in life I believe.

The memories are endless. Thank you all for being a part of O'Reilly's and our lives . . . and thank you my baby boy for giving us the privilege and honor of making life's journey with you. Goodbye for now.

# Kelsey & Cinnamon

We adopted our first Golden from NORCAL in July 1995. Kelsey was underweight and flea bitten, but a real sweetie. I was with her almost 24/7. She followed me everywhere during my daily chores – loved to go "bye bye," wrestled with my husband, and played hide and seek



with the kids. She always helped me get my granddaughter, who lives with us, up for school in the mornings.

In April 2006, at 13 years of age, she died from laryngeal paralysis. We thought we should wait a while to get over losing our Kelsey girl before contacting NORCAL again. A week passed. We weren't feeling better and in fact we were feeling worse! No doggie nails clicking on the floor as I did my work; no doggie tags jingling behind me as I went from room to room. Waiting wasn't working.

So we contacted NORCAL again and anxiously awaited hearing from our area coordinator. I checked with her almost daily by email. I know she must have been tired of hearing from me. But then, around the middle of May, I got the message I was waiting for. Two Goldens had been picked up on a Friday night. They had both been living in cages and having puppies their whole lives. We set up an appointment to see them on Sunday afternoon.

The reddish Golden girl, Cinnamon, immediately took up with my 7-year-old granddaughter. She was a little leery of me and didn't want to go near my son or husband. The foster mom said that they thought she had been treated badly by a male so was very cautious around them. It was very hard to choose only one girl to bring home and leave the other behind, but our landlord would only allow one.

We chose Cinnamon and on Wednesday morning, after being spayed, she was ours. Cinnamon was a little nervous, but since we were going "bye bye," she came along willingly. She finally relaxed and fell asleep on the 2-hour ride home. She didn't wag her tail or hold her head up, and if you reached for her, she would flinch and drop her head. She wouldn't come when you called her and she didn't know how to play. We had some work to do!

I would get on the floor with my front-



half down and my rear-end in the air in play pose to get her going. She would get a treat when she would come when called, but we learned that she was very stubborn and had a dominant personality. A friend thought that she may be hard of hearing because she wouldn't come so I went into another room and quietly said "treat" and there she came!

Almost a year later, Cinnamon is a different girl. Head up, tail wagging, a bundle of energy and joy! She still loves kids and has to be right in the middle when my granddaughter and her friends are playing. She lays next to us and always has a paw touching us. She is still learning that I am the alpha dog around here and to come every time she's called - not just when she feels like it! We still miss Kelsey terribly, but Cinnamon has helped so much in our healing. She is very much in our hearts now too. We can't thank NORCAL enough for the love, fun, joy, and companionship our two Golden girls have given us! 🖄

## Don't Get Burned with a Puppy Mill Puppy or Dog!

What is a puppy mill? A puppy mill is a large-scale breeding operation that produces large numbers of puppies for profit. The dogs are raised in inhumane conditions, usually crowded in cages, never handled or socialized, and never receive proper veterinary care.

Profit is the main motivation – pump out as many cheaply bred litters as possible, produce sick and genetically defective puppies, and sell them through pet stores and Web sites to an unsuspecting public. When the parents' breeding usefulness is over, they may be killed or dumped. The pet owner gets stuck with high vet bills, a dead puppy, or a genetic cripple. So how can you avoid buying a puppy mill puppy? Pet stores sell puppy mill puppies because they are cheap to buy, and because no truly reputable breeder would ever sell a pup through a pet store. Good breeders care about where their puppies go! Web sites sell puppy mill puppies. All those Internet puppy ads? Puppy mills!!

Puppy mills want you to give them a credit card number or send them a check, and they will ship the puppy to you. Why? They don't want you to see the horrifying conditions that your puppy was raised in. They want to keep their operations hidden from sight. A good breeder will never send a dog to you sight unseen. They want to meet you, and they will welcome you to their home. Never order a puppy through a Web site.

I am happy to say that Rosie is fine – happy, healthy, and none the worse for her life-threatening ordeal. I also want to say that there will be no old-fashioned buckled collars in my house ever again. The new collars I have ordered are called "breakaway" collars. Having read the Web site testimonials, I have come to realize that what we experienced, and what I've described, is not an isolated incident. Some animals have not been as lucky as mine.

I encourage every dog owner to go to the Web site www.breakawaycollar.com or just do a search for breakaway collars to prevent a potential tragedy from happening. It almost happened to my dog. Don't let it happen to yours.





## Jill Morgan Area Coordinator, San Joaquin County

NORCAL's own Jill Morgan was featured in a recent 2-page article in the *Lodi News-Sentinel* newspaper. Here are some excerpts.

"Jill Morgan happened to be wandering around a pet fair eight years ago when she came across a sign reading, 'NORCAL Golden Retriever Rescue.' She thought it meant the dogs rescued people trapped in emergencies, but soon learned that the dogs themselves had been rescued. 'Those dogs had been thrown away, abused, abandoned. And that was it,' Morgan said of the day when she decided to get involved with the non-profit group.

"So far this year, she's seen 79 purebred Golden Retrievers who no longer had homes and were abandoned. And that's just in the San Joaquin Valley. She buys 300 pounds of dog food at a time and is well-known by her veterinarian."

## Pat Lynch Area Coordinator, Alameda County

NORCAL's own Pat Lynch was quoted in a recent multi-page article about puppy mill dogs in the *San Francisco Chronicle* on June 12. Pat was a volunteer involved in the rescue of 49 dogs from a puppy mill in Oklahoma. A group of veterinarians, vet techs, and volunteers from rescue groups, like Pat, worked together to get the dogs here, cleaned up, cared for, and placed in new homes.

Most of the dogs were suffering from severe health problems. This article is an excellent exposé on puppy mills and Internet dogs best summed up by a quote from Dr. Helen Hamilton, "It's a money-driven industry and the only way to stop it is when people become educated not to buy puppies from these sources."

## Pam Lavin Volunteer, Santa Clara County

Thanks to Pam Lavin for writing this article.

As a NORCAL volunteer for 14 years, there are many, many stories to report. Our Santa Clara County team has worked on surrenders, adoptions, and home visits. This all started well before the Internet made communication easier. There was no craigslist.com, few microchips to identify pets, and rare foster homes. No matter what, there's always been a lot of paperwork! Adoption forms, surrender forms, vet records, and AKC registrations piled high on our desks.

I remember once a legally signed surrender form saved me during my first assignment. A woman called me about a puppy she had received from a breeder friend. She had no time for it. The youngster was kept in a small crate from which I released her after having the surrender signed. I had barely arrived home when the ex-owner called to say she had changed her mind. More likely, her friend told her she could SELL the dog. I refused her request and shortly afterwards, the local police phoned me with an accusation of dog-napping. Fortunately, the signed sheet was valid enough proof to have them back off.

Sometimes, Realtors would phone us to report dogs abandoned at properties they represented. On one occasion an impoverished lady and her pair of Goldens had been abandoned by her husband. By herself, she raised and placed the subsequent litter and requested that the parents come to NORCAL. However, her ex and his new girlfriend also wanted the parents! Soon his lawyer was calling us, but we stood firm and the pair found a new home together. Adoptions are usually happy, but can be equally surprising. One of our applicants took a young male who turned out to be the littermate of her recently deceased pet. Another lady, whose dog had been stolen a year earlier came to us from another county and amazingly found her own dog on our list. We traced his trail from a shelter to another rescue group to a purchase by our surrendering family. His ID was confirmed by physical marks and photos.

Sometimes a person will want to train one of our dogs to be a disability aide. These people we refer to professional canine therapy groups, since we want to keep NORCAL dogs family members, not assigned to lifetime service. However, in at least one placement, the Golden's temperament led to her training as a police dog. One former assistance dog did come to us because of abuse and spent many years as the neighborhood favorite, delighted to lead an unfettered life.

Many of our dogs come from the shelters, particularly if they are aged or have a physical or behavioral problem. Some are just dumped in the night box. It may take longer to place them, but these needy Goldens often make the best pets. They seem grateful for a second chance.

With the advent of selling dogs online, a new set of issues has developed. Puppy mill dogs go to pet shops or are sold online. They may be young or auctioned off when unable to breed successfully. Dog brokers import litters from out of state, making extravagant and false statements about health and backgrounds. One account was recently chronicled by our volunteer, Loretta Miller, in her new book, "Blind Puppy Five Dollars." Over the years we have seen more early cancer, allergies, and limb dysplasia. A breed like the Golden suffers from its own popularity. However, there is still great joy in our learning and efforts to educate the public. The years have flown by with wonderful memories, stories, and a surprise around every corner.

## Donating to NGRR

Since our organization is staffed entirely by volunteers, every penny of your contribution will help pay for veterinary care, food, and other direct expenses required in our work to rescue and find loving homes for hundreds of Golden Retrievers each year.

#### Gifts by Check or Credit Card

A gift by check or credit card may be made outright or as a pledge to be fulfilled over a period of up to five years. If you itemize tax deductions, your contribution is fully deductible up to 50% of your adjusted gross income; any excess can be carried forward for up to five additional years. To make a gift by check, simply fill out the donation slip, write your check, and mail to NGRR. To make a gift by credit card, please also tell us the type of credit card, card number, expiration date, and name as it appears on the card.

#### Payroll Deduction

The simplest (and most painless) way for many of us to manage our gift giving is with an easy payroll deduction. Inspired by "Zack," a severely dysplastic Golden taken in and treated by NGRR, this fund was established to provide extensive veterinary care, surgery, and rehabilitation to young and deserving Goldens who are critically ill, deformed and/or injured. These dogs need immediate access to funds to restore their quality of life - and, in extreme cases, to save their lives - without financially burdening their adoptive families.
