Once, he was standing in my waiting room with his mouth open and a little boy, who had just learned how to walk, waddled up to him and stuck his hand and a biscuit into Elliott's mouth. There were patients who would come to my office because of Elliott. And there were patients who would pretend to be sick so that they could see Elliott. He was the most wonderful dog anyone could have. He died peacefully just one year ago after almost 13 years of living and loving life fully. He is sorely missed and loved forever.

I was getting daily calls from Jim keeping me updated on the illness of Rex, the Golden Retriever I had helped him adopt two years earlier. Within a week, Rex went over the rainbow bridge sending Jim into deep grief. It brought back the same depression he felt upon losing his wife a few years back.

Since adopting Rex, Jim had moved from his large home with a fenced yard to a townhouse with a small yard. Finding a calm, senior Golden that would fit into Jim's new lifestyle would be a challenge. NGRR volunteers were alerted and before long, an owner-surrender arrived needing a home, so we went to meet Riley. The foster presented Riley to Jim and everything went smoothly until she handed him the leash and Jim almost went flying.

I spent a sleepless night wondering how I was going to tell Jim that Riley was too big and strong from him. I called Trish King, a dog behaviorist at Marin Humane for advice who told me about a cocker spaniel named Pip available for adoption. When I called Jim to ask if he noticed how difficult it was for him to control big Riley on the leash, he replied, "Are you trying to tell me I do not qualify for the dog?" He then said he had the same opinion and did not know how to tell me! That made it easy. When I told him about the cocker spaniel, he was unusually happy and ready to meet him.

You may have guessed the ending, but there is more you should know. Jim names all his dogs Rex, a fitting name for big Goldens, but this small cocker? While waiting for the paperwork to be completed, we visited the store to have an ID tag engraved. When asked what name he wished to engrave Jim replied, "Snuffles." I was pleased Pip would not become Rex, but Snuffles? I looked at Jim puzzled, but he just stood there smiling.

He told me in a very emotional voice that Pip's former owners who surrendered him had the same name as his late wife's maiden name and when he met his wife, she owned a cocker spaniel that looked exactly like Pip – and, you guessed it, named Snuffles!

Frodo



Spotlight on VOLUNTEERS

Sam

We wanted to share Sam's story with you because he, and the thousands of others like him that have been (or will be) helped by NGRR, are why we volunteer. But for us, it's not just helping the dogs – it's the dogs enriching our lives. Thank you Sam for sharing your life with us. We'll miss you terribly.

Terry, Tracy, and Bunny Ricketts

Sam was an owner surrender at 10¹/₂ years of age. When Terry picked him up in March 2007 it was clear he was one neglected old guy. He was overweight, covered in mats, and had a horrible cough, which his owner explained was "from the dust under the house where he sleeps." He was also blind in one eye - the result of a dog fight. Terry smiled, had them sign the paperwork, and got him out of there quickly! When he got him home, we cleaned him up and then took him into the vet the next day where he weighed in at 118 pounds! But it was that cough that had us worried the most and sure enough he tested positive for heartworms - the worst case our vet had ever seen. His heart was doubled in size and his lungs showed pneumonia.

We debated whether heartworm treatment would be effective, or if he could survive the shots. We decided that we needed to treat an extremely low thyroid condition first, which combined with a little exercise and a strict diet showed a slight improvement but he still showed pneumonia. Sam's savior – Dr. Liz – spent hours on the phone with her peers in Florida (the Mecca of heartworm) and we decided it was worth the chance to try treatment, but we would alter the approach some.

In May he received his first dose of Immiticide. While the conventional treatment calls for two doses 24 hours apart, Sam was too sick for that. So we gave him one dose, which went well, and then waited eight weeks and in July we decided to try the next step with two more doses. The first of those doses went fine, but the next day he spiked a fever and his vet recommended we not go though with the last dose. Instead, after 4 weeks we started him on monthly Heartguard and hoped for the best. During this time he continued to drop weight and became healthier with the cough almost non-existent by September.

In January, Sam tested negative for heartworms! His new X-rays showed clear lungs and a heart that was looking far more normal. During this ordeal, it was clear that Sam had also been emotionally neglected. He didn't play, and really didn't know anything about love. At first he kept to himself and wasn't really social at all. As time went on, the true Golden appeared. He took pure joy in getting his first stuffed toy that was all his. He started to come ask for a good scratch and I'll never forget the first time he gave me a kiss.

Four weeks ago an ultra sound revealed a large tumor attached to his liver. We are definitely sad that Sam has left us, but at the same time we are happy that he had more than a year where he was loved everyday. Happy that for at least the last year he was able to be a happy dog. Happy that he was able to experience the simple pleasures of his own toy, a roll in the grass, a car ride, a run on the beach, the taste of fresh snow, a romp at the dog park, and a good game of ball.

Donating to NGRR

Since our organization is staffed entirely by volunteers, every penny of your contribution will help pay for veterinary care, food, and other direct expenses required in our work to rescue and find loving homes for hundreds of Golden Retrievers each year.

Gifts by Check or Credit Card

A gift by check or credit card may be made outright or as a pledge to be fulfilled over a period of up to five years. If you itemize tax deductions, your contribution is fully deductible up to 50% of your adjusted gross income; any excess can be carried forward for up to five additional years. To make a gift by check, simply fill out the donation slip, write your check, and mail to NGRR. To make a gift by credit card, please also tell us the type of credit card, card number, expiration date, and name as it appears on the card.

Payroll Deduction

The simplest (and most painless) way for many of us to manage our gift giving is with an easy payroll deduction. Each year United Way, the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC), and other charitable campaigns give working people the opportunity to allocate payroll deductions or make a one-time contribution at work. Ask your employer for a Donor Option Card to direct your United Way contribution to NGRR.

Matching Gift

Over 6,000 companies encourage their employees' philanthropy through a matching gift program whereby your employer will match your individual donations. This generous program doubles - and sometimes triples - your donation. Ask your human resources department if your employer has such a program. If so, you will be given a matching gift form to send to NGRR with your donation, and we'll do the rest!

Appreciated Securities

Your outright gift of long-term, appreciated securities (stocks, mutual funds and bonds) is exempt from capital gains taxes and, in most cases, enables you to obtain a charitable income tax deduction equal to the market value of the securities at the time of transfer, for up to 30% of your adjusted gross income.

Gifts Through Your Estate

For many of us, making a gift through our estate is the most realistic way to make a substantial contribution to NGRR. At the same time, a carefully planned estate gift can reduce or eliminate federal estate taxes, depending upon the size of vour estate.

Life Income Gifts You may be able to make a gift and receive direct financial benefits. Some financial vehicles, such as charitable trusts, can provide you and/or your spouse with an income for life and a charitable income tax deduction as well. These vehicles often pay a rate of return that exceeds money market and CD rates. In addition, they typically help avoid capital gains taxes and reduce estate taxes. Gifts can also be made through your estate while preserving assets for your current needs.

Gifts of Real Estate

You can make a gift of commercial or residential real estate and receive substantial financial benefits. If you give the property outright, you can qualify for a charitable income tax deduction based on the appraised value of the property.

Tell NGRR How to Use Your Donation

There are several ways you can direct NGRR to allocate your contribution. You may choose to spread your donation across all funds, or you may tell us to apply all of it to a specific cause.

General Fund

Contributions to this fund will pay for ordinary veterinary care, food, and other expenses directly related to our Goldens in foster care. Any excess monies in this fund are allocated to NGRR's emergency reserve to help cover catastrophic events, such as earthquakes and puppy mill raids, in communities throughout Northern California.

Senior Goldens

Contributions to this fund will be used exclusively to support the extra veterinary and foster care usually required for dogs eight years and older - our well-deserving Golden Oldies.

Zack's Fund

Inspired by "Zack," a severely dysplastic Golden taken in and treated by NGRR, this fund was established to provide extensive veterinary care, surgery, and rehabilitation to young and deserving Goldens who are critically ill, deformed and/or injured. These dogs need immediate access to funds to restore their quality of life - and, in extreme cases, to save their lives - without financially burdening their adoptive families.
