
# Golden Retriever

# Tanner & I.O.

When it comes to dogs, I certainly wasn't aware of fostering before I came across NGRR. After all, we all know that there are two main methods when considering a new addition to the family: the pound or the breeder.

I grew up with a Golden, aptly named "Goldie." We got her when her previous owner had to give her up when his job moved abroad. Goldie was a sweet, active 3-year-old purebred. She was great with the whole family, even my 5-year-old sister. Goldie never lashed out, never snapped, and never questioned why things were the way they were. She simply accepted and enjoyed. It was this very compatible breed trait that sealed my love of Goldens.

My wife found out about fostering when we started looking to add a Golden to our family. She came across NGRR and saw the fostering program, which provides a home to a surrendered Golden until a "furever home" can be found. In many ways this was ideal: We would not only evaluate whether or not we were ready for a dog, we would still be doing good by taking in a dog in need.

So we applied. We meticulously entered the information into the online foster application. We had to articulate the environment, care philosophy, training regimen, and experience we were bringing to the table as a foster family.

We received a call quickly: Paul, one of NGRR's Area Coordinators scheduled a home visit within the week. When we opened the door, we greeted a very down to earth dog owner and a 60-pound Golden named "Andy." Andy invited himself in, sniffed around our house, peed in the backyard, and fell asleep under our dining table. Nearly an hour later, Paul and Andy left. Our foster application was approved and we were in the line to receive Goldens.

One week later, we got the call: Paul apologized right off the bat for throwing us into the deep end on our first foster Goldens. Yep, plural. Tanner and I.O. were a 3.5-year-old bonded brother and sister – both nearly 15 pounds overweight, sorely in need of grooming, and as hyperactive as a 3-year-old child on candy. They had been surrendered in Redwood City by an owner who had fallen on hard times. Paul spent nearly a week working with the owner to ensure that he knew Tanner and I.O. would be in a better place through NGRR's program. When Paul went to pick up Tanner and I.O. the owner was in tears, but with Paul's experience as an Area Coordinator the owner had the confidence in NGRR to surrender his two long time family companions to place them in a better home.

When Paul walked Tanner and I.O. through our door they were instantly panting and craving attention. Due to their seclusion in the garage for nearly a year, they were keen for as much attention and affection as they could get, fearing that they might end up back in the garage. The panting was non-stop through the morning and evening hours, as the two of them forced their heads under our hands and into our laps. To go from no dog to two giant hyperactive, attention craving, undercoat

shedding dogs was quite a shock. I have never consumed as much coffee as I did that week.

We evaluated Tanner and I.O. over that week on twice a day walks, socialization, food aggression, bathing and grooming, vet visits for a health workup, and waiting for Paul to find us a candidate for this bonded pair. Ten days after Tanner and IO walked into our home, we met a family from Aptos that made the

nearly 3 hour drive to see the pair. They had brought along their miniature Italian greyhound for compatibility. We put the potential furever family through a series of questions to determine if this family was the right fit. They passed with willingness to exercise the pair, provide the proper medical care, follow a training method that would keep them safe, and above all provide a fit home. That night, the family signed the adoption contract and took both Tanner and I.O. home.

Seven fosters have passed through our home since we first started with NGR.: In addition to Tanner and I.O., Molly, Uncle, Max, Bailey, and Knight have come through our care and been placed into families that are a fantastic fit. With each foster, we learn a little more about being better foster parents. With each adoption, the happy dog and family's faces bring us unbelievable joy. As for our own family, we adopted Molly, now "Puppy," to our home, to be the forever canine hostess to the foster dogs that come into our care. But that is another story ... 

## Another Foster Story: The Trials and Tribulations of 'Puppy' Training

We started fostering for the NGRR in 2012. At the time, we knew fostering would let us know if we were ready for a dog, and we would have the right of first refusal on any foster dog that came through our care. We knew that to ensure success,

the dog had to be the right "fit." We knew that everyone says they want the active, friendly, happy dog... until they actually get the hyperactive, in your face, nonstop dog.

We got the call from Joan, one of the Area Coordinators we had been working with, on February 1st, just at the end of a three week trip in Hong Kong. Joan let us know that there was an incoming 6-month-old Golden surrender that needed an immediate foster home. "Molly" was being surrendered by an owner who was unable to deal with the Golden puppy's energy and activity level. We agreed to foster her and then hopped an afternoon flight from Hong Kong to SFO. The next day, Joan arrived with Molly.

We were completely unprepared for Molly, even though we had previously fostered a pair of attention craving 3-year-old Goldens. Molly had originally been purchased by the surrendering owner through a puppy broker on Craigslist. NGRR had been tracking and recording the activities of this particular broker, who bought entire litters of Golden puppies from unknown sources along the west coast, and then sold them individually via Craigslist complete with forged AKC papers and questionable vet records. The surrendering owner had tried to deal with Molly's puppy behavior (combined with a total lack of training) for 6 months but had become overwhelmed. Molly's last act in the owner's house was stealing a tub of Cool Whip from the refrigerator and spreading it all over the house.

Molly came to our home the day after the Cool Whip incident. Molly was your classic 6 month old – high energy, chewed everything, and ate like a monster. Yes she was cute, adorable, and anyone could easily fall in love with her. However, she was a ball of high powered-energy, a tornado of fur, a waterfall of slobber, and had a tail that could take out

a small child.

So we put Molly through the foster process: we started her with clicker training, began twice daily walks, created a feeding ritual, and checked for signs of aggression and socialization.

Carla, a member of NGRR's vet committee, setup Molly's

account at a local vet hospital in preparation for Molly's exam and spay surgery. We brought Molly to the vet hospital and took her home that night as a lethargic, drugged up dog decorated with a "cone of shame."

We were told that her recovery would take up to a week, and to limit her activity level appropriately. At this point, we knew the clock was ticking. Should we adopt Molly ourselves or start placement calls with potential families so that Molly would be placed as soon as she completed her recovery?

Caring for Molly over the next day as she came off the anesthesia was a particularly touching experience. Nursing her back to health created a bond that lead to my decision to adopt Molly only two days after the surgery. But adopting a canine family member shouldn't be a unilateral decision. My wife was unsure due to Molly's high energy level and total lack of obedience. Together, we had to decide if we would be willing to exercise, train, and provide a fulfilling life to Molly. So after another 3 days, we both committed to Molly, and made the phone call to Joan.

We spent the next couple of weeks doing the things that new dog owners do. We renamed Molly to "Puppy" (yep, Puppy). We took her to the San Mateo SPCA to get her chipped and gave her a new collar and tags. We did a massive amount of research online into her problems with excessive chewing, uncontrollable excitement, counter

surfing, etc. Puppy continued to pull uncontrollably on walks and chew up anything that she could get her jaws on. While our own training was slowly teaching her simple commands such as "sit" or "down," we were not able to correct some of the larger issues.

We opted to get a single, private training session in our (Continued on page 12)

home so the trainer could observe Puppy in her own environment and help us understand how to communicate correctly with Puppy. After this training session, we were able to use clicker and treat training to teach Puppy the basic commands such as sit, down, stay, and come.

Unfortunately, we were not able to use this newfound knowledge to solve her other issues. Puppy still chewed up our kitchen towels, socks, and shoes, and only chose to obey our commands if she deemed the treat being offered as valuable enough to warrant her attention. So we took it to the next step: we started visiting in-kennel training facilities and interviewed the trainers.

We decided to place Puppy with a trainer and her pack in Pacifica, where Puppy lived for three weeks with no visits from us. When we finally picked her up, she looked like the same dog: excited, energetic, and crazy. The trainer spent an hour that day teaching us the foundation she had trained into Puppy: leash handling, verbal commands, visual hand cues, how to "read" Puppy, and praising at the correct

time. We had another two follow up sessions over the next five weeks to ensure that we were maintaining the foundation.

Now at 15 months old, after a lot of consistency and training, we're proud to say that Puppy listens and obeys. She has a multitude of tricks up her sleeve, still gets excited but knows how to control herself better, and combined with the socialization she learned at doggie day care, she has grown into a young adult. Puppy's skills and behavior now make her a great hostess to all the foster dogs that have come through our home, helping us evaluate for socialization as well as teaching the fosters the proper way to be a dog.

Puppy's name really says it all: it's the reason she was surrendered, the reason she tested us, and ultimately the reason we love her. The trials and tribulations Puppy put us through, but more important the growth and learning we had to put ourselves through, turned Puppy into a happy, well-trained, and fulfilled Golden. And this is why, to this day, we still volunteer with NGRR even after adopting our very own Golden.

# International Rescue: Rebecca's Story

I lost my first and very special Golden, Scottey, Sir Scott of Lindsey, in May of this year. He was my first Golden and a companion I will never forget. It took me months to get over his loss. However, I contacted NGRR to see if they had a special Golden I could bring home.

I'd love to introduce you to "Hannah," a precious 11-year-old Golden I adopted from the NGRR about two months ago. Formerly known as Nana, I felt her name reflected an old lady, so I changed it to Hannah, thinking it was close enough so

she would still respond.

I knew she might have Cushings disease before I adopted her. Cushings causes the adrenal glands to oversecrete and makes her urinate and drink water often. She was tested and sure enough she has Cushings. She's been on Vetoryl for five weeks now and has made "significant progress" according to the vet. She'll need to be tested in another six months to ensure the meds are still on track. Cushings caused a bare spot on her back but the fur is growing back nicely now and her energy is just amazing. NGRR has graciously reimbursed me for the first two Cushings tests and I will gladly take care of her monthly meds and tests from here on out.

Originally overweight, Hannah lost about 8 pounds with her foster mom and another 8 pounds with me. She's a svelte 65 pounds now. She's on a fresh veggie diet, with a little dog kibble, and really enjoys her meals. However, she's a little stinker when cruising the vegetable garden. She loves the strawberries and tomatoes, so I have to watch how much she inhales.

When she first arrived she had to contend with Franklin, my large white, blue-eyed and beautiful rescue cat. He'd had a rough life and was tentative at first. But they soon became best buds.

Then I brought home "Zephyr," an 8-week-old kitten who was abandoned with his mom and siblings without food or water. Hannah adapted well to the kitten, in fact Zephyr sleeps curled up next to Hannah every night. How precious is that? Our last Golden was such a big part of our family that when he passed away in October 2012, we were heartbroken and not sure we wanted another Golden. As time went by we realized we wanted another Golden not only for us, but for "Akuji," our 12-year-old terrier mix.

There were no young male dogs available on the NGRR website but I filled out the adoption form and shortly after, we heard from Nick Ward. Nick came over to do a yard inspection, but he wasn't very promising that we'd find a Golden any time soon.

My husband, Glenn and I heard about Goldens coming from Taiwan but that they might have heartworm. Jill Morgan told us to go on Facebook to check a group of Goldens arriving soon. I can't get on Facebook. It's getting late but I know my neighbor is OK with 9:00 p.m. calls, so I call her but she can't get on Facebook! So she calls another neighbor who calls me and says, "You want to see some dogs in Taiwan?" When we got to her house she already had the site open. "Whiskey" was the first one I saw and was instantly in love.

On Wednesday, May 29 my husband and I were at San Francisco Airport along with Jill, the NGRR volunteers, and other hopeful adopters. Finally, the dogs appeared – four of them in their crates. Once we were outside, we were allowed to walk "our dog" and see if we were a good match. He seemed like a sweet dog. All the dogs jumped into Jill's car so she could take them to her vet for the heartworm treatment. When we learned the next day that the heartworm medication wouldn't be in for 3 weeks we were allowed to take Whiskey to our vet.

Nick had given us some advice on introducing Whiskey to

Akuji and it worked perfectly. The next day, Whiskey officially became "Dillon" and the next week he started his three-day heartworm treatment.

Heartworms are a serious problem, but dealing with it wasn't as hard as we first thought. You must keep the dog inactive for two weeks. The next two weeks he can be a little more active. Then over the final two weeks he builds up to normal activity. A lot of bonding took place over those six weeks. Now Dillon can do anything he wants to.

We have a ride-on train that circles our yard. On July 4th we decided to run the train and see if Dillon wanted to ride. He loved it and didn't want to get off! We have run the train more in the last three months than we have in the past two years. He doesn't normally like to wear hats but when a train ride is available he's more than willing to get dressed up and wear that dumb hat as long as the train ride lasts. Dillon is a very friendly, happy-golucky dog and is always ready for another train ride!

## Donating to NGRR

Since our organization is staffed entirely by volunteers, every penny of your contribution will help pay for veterinary care, food, and other direct expenses required in our work to rescue and find loving homes for hundreds of Golden Retrievers each year.

#### Gifts by Check or Credit Card

A gift by check or credit card may be made outright or as a pledge to be fulfilled over a period of up to five years. If you itemize tax deductions, your contribution is fully deductible up to 50% of your adjusted gross income; any excess can be carried forward for up to five additional years. To make a gift by check, simply fill out the donation slip, write your check, and mail to NGRR. To make a gift by credit card, please also tell us the type of credit card, card number, expiration date, and name as it appears on the card.

#### Payroll Deduction

The simplest (and most painless) way for many of us to manage our gift giving is with an easy payroll deduction. Each year United Way, the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC), and other charitable campaigns give working people the opportunity to allocate payroll deductions or make a one-time contribution at work. Ask your employer for a Donor Option Card to direct your United Way contribution to NGRR.

## Matching Gift

Over 6,000 companies encourage their employees' philanthropy through a matching gift program whereby your employer will match your individual donations. This generous program doubles - and sometimes triples - your donation. Ask your human resources department if your employer has such a program. If so, you will be given a matching gift form to send to NGRR with your donation, and we'll do the rest!

## Appreciated Securities

Your outright gift of long-term, appreciated securities (stocks, mutual funds and bonds) is exempt from capital gains taxes and, in most cases, enables you to obtain a charitable income tax deduction equal to the market value of the securities at the time of transfer, for up to 30% of your adjusted gross income.

## Gifts Through Your Estate

For many of us, making a gift through our estate is the most realistic way to make a substantial contribution to NGRR. At the same time, a carefully planned estate gift can reduce or eliminate federal estate taxes, depending upon the size of vour estate.

## Life Income Gifts

You may be able to make a gift and receive direct financial benefits. Some financial vehicles, such as charitable trusts, can provide you and/or your spouse with an income for life and a charitable income tax deduction as well. These vehicles often pay a rate of return that exceeds money market and CD rates. In addition, they typically help avoid capital gains taxes and reduce estate taxes. Gifts can also be made through your estate while preserving assets for your current needs.

## Gifts of Real Estate

You can make a gift of commercial or residential real estate and receive substantial financial benefits. If you give the property outright, you can qualify for a charitable income tax deduction based on the appraised value of the property.

#### Tell NGRR How to Use Your Donation

There are several ways you can direct NGRR to allocate your contribution. You may choose to spread your donation across all funds, or you may tell us to apply all of it to a specific cause.

#### General Fund

Contributions to this fund will pay for ordinary veterinary care, food, and other expenses directly related to our Goldens in foster care. Any excess monies in this fund are allocated to NGRR's emergency reserve to help cover catastrophic events, such as earthquakes and puppy mill raids, in communities throughout Northern California.

#### Senior Goldens

Contributions to this fund will be used exclusively to support the extra veterinary and foster care usually required for dogs eight years and older - our well-deserving Golden Oldies.

## Special Needs Fund

Inspired by "Zack," a severely dysplastic Golden taken in and treated by NGRR, this fund was established to provide extensive veterinary care, surgery, and rehabilitation to young and deserving Goldens who are critically ill, deformed and/or injured. These dogs need immediate access to funds to restore their quality of life - and, in extreme cases, to save their lives - without financially burdening their adoptive families.

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
