On August 14th, Buddy was dropped off for euthanasia at the San Jose Animal Care. We immediately called Steve and Debi Chick to see if they would be willing to take him home. He was only 8 years old, clearly sick, but still wanting to live. Steve drove down and picked up Buddy and got him into the vet. Yep, lymphoma and glaucoma. The vet gave him pain meds and eye drops to make him comfortable and said he would not live very long. Every day he went to the park to play ball and see all the dogs. Two weeks later it was time to refill the prescription, and the vet cautioned Steve about going to the park and playing ball. Buddy was having none of that, so the fetch continued. He had some rough times scattered throughout his time with them, but most all the days were very good. Steve and Debi provided a loving home until February 1, 2022, when they helped him cross over at home.

Hello Friends, I may not act my age, but I am 11, so in this issue I am featuring a home-cooked meal for Senior Dogs from the "Real Food for Dogs" recipe book.

CHICKEN SWEET POTATO ENTREE

Ingredients

6 oz. Skinless Chicken Breast 1.5 Cups White Rice 1 Sweet Potato 1 Carrot 2 Tbs Sunflower Oil

1 1,000mg Calcium Supplement (for my arthritis ⁽ⁱⁱⁱ⁾) Liquid contents of a 100IU Vitamin E capsule

Instructions:

- Broil or boil the chicken breast
- Steam the rice
- Microwave the sweet potato until a fork slides easily in and out Peel and mash
- Slice and boil or steam the carrot
- Add the oil, calcium and Vitamin E
- Cool before serving Bon Appetit!

Annie joined our home 7 years ago at the age of 2. She was in rough shape - flearidden, overweight, banished to the backyard, and emotionally starved for affection. It's hard for us to imagine her living her first 2 years of life alone in a backyard because she wanted nothing more than love and companionship. She quickly joined our family and also bonded with neighbors, friends, and a daily group of elementary school kids walking to school (she was their chaperone). She loved long walks in the hills of our neighborhood, running free at the beach and chasing seagulls, bathing in the hot sun, sleeping tummy side up, and patrolling the backyard. She had a strong maternal instinct, nurturing and guiding her



younger brother Teddy, as well as puppies new to the neighborhood, who would run to her for comfort. A mere 2 days before she died, she was greeting a puppy new to the street, nose to nose, tail wagging. Annie was very emotional and intuitive; she could often read our facial expressions and know exactly what we were conveying, without us ever saying a word. Everyone who met her, from family members to neighbors to vets to even the surgeon who repaired her torn tendon used the word "sweet" when talking about her. She was our Sweet Annie Girl. We had to let her go last year after an unexpected and aggressive tumor took her health. She was 9 years old and passed peacefully in the sun with her blanket.

She is taken on regular walks, gets lots of love and attention, and is becoming comfortable in new surroundings. Debbie tells me that Fraise is "attached to her at the hip" and they are falling in love with her.

Sierra Veterinary Specialists in Reno, NV are working to find out if there might be another option for treatment to help Fraise with her bladder leakage. Until then, thanks to her "new family", she will have the love and attention she so desperately needs. Debbie says she's becoming "one spoiled dog". But, that's okay – she deserves it!

Simba's Journey

In the Fall newsletter we told you the story of Simba, who came to NGRR with several medical issues. As promised, now we want to tell you about Simba's emotional and social journey. We love this dog to the moon and back.

In the beginning, it was clear Simba lacked wider socialization, or perhaps had been through so much transition, his anxiety was getting the better of him. Having only ever had "people people!" Goldens, I was taken aback when Simba exhibited strong defense behavior. Two weeks into being home, Simba lunged and nipped the hand of a long time family friend in our backyard. Shocked, I immediately went into assessment protocol remembering the '3 days, 3 weeks and 3 months' adjustment timelines. We set boundaries to better understand why he was reacting in such a way. Off leash, he exhibited defensiveness while in the home or in the back yard only (not on walks). He aggressively vocalized his opinion of the FedEx man, the gardener, and any other unannounced, unwelcome guest. My heart was determined to restore his sense of trust.

We quickly figured out that introductions to new individuals had to occur outside in the driveway, with Eric being the one to hug and talk to the "new pack members" to show Simba they were approved of, rather than holding the leash. Over time we allowed him around young kids, while on a leash only and under strict supervision. At first, these loud, spinning and abruptly random tornadoes of youth were disruptive and unsettling and had to be barked into control. We went back to the drawing board and decided to introduce adults, working toward younger and younger over time ages that knew how to respect/interact with



a dog. Simba built trust in us and we are happy to report that 1 year later - Simba happily vacuumed behind an 18 month old, all the while taking care not to knock her over. He allowed her to pick up his toys and even reach for ones in his possession. He also enjoyed meal time, as he and Brooke had negotiated a crumbs quotient.

Timing is everything. Simba needed all three of us, and we needed him even more, having lost Eric's father that September. I underestimated the bond Simba and Eric would develop, and we would have had less progress in adjustment without Sydney. She taught Simba how to be calm, how to integrate with strangers - and even fetched us during now abated counter surfing events. By fall 2020, Simba began to trust and to settle. Sydney was the strong and silent type, highly intelligent, reserved, yet observant. I failed to realize just how big of a piece of my heart she had and to what degree she was "my dog". We spent our 15th Christmas together and said our goodbyes on January 6th, 2022.

A day in the life, today. Like most Goldens, he loves to be where his humans are. As I write this, Simba is plopped at the

base of the chair Eric is using to reach/fix the kitchen nook light, classic rock blasting in the house. Calm and collected, unless vocally expressing his jealousy while not part of a hug or expression of love. He is by far the most vocal Golden I have ever known - one wonders if he was raised with Huskies! He also adores Eric's mother. She claims it's a common interest in Tchaikovsky, not the amount of treats. Simba starts his day sleeping in, the last out of bed, has breakfast, and shuffles his way down the hall to Eric's home office, toy in mouth. If the door is not latched, he will barge his way in for morning hellos, and then plop into his spot next to Eric's chair. The mammoth of a dog has often made it on camera - as his head sits at 30 inches high. If Eric leaves on his motorcycle, "Chimba" is glued to the door until his return, upon which he presents Eric with the nearest gift he can find. When it's time for a walk, "Chimba" fetches his leash and halter. When the cats are cuddling on the couch, he gently barges his way onto a cushion or three. After dinner he serenades his living room audience with big therapeutic doggie snores. If a late night TV marathon is in order, he will get up and go to bed on his own about 9pm. He loves to have human touch. Thank goodness given the amount of ear cleaning, washing and eye treating! He also allows us to clean between his toes, trim his feet, and roll him from side to side on the floor — but then again what Golden doesn't?

It has certainly been a significant amount of work, but an effort resulting in collective benefit. This rescue is worth every penny and ounce of time. Simba's eyebrows are filling in, erasing the heart shaped scarring around his eyes and he now has eye lashes! He does take up the majority of the couch cushions, but we wouldn't have it any other way.

Dear Abby-Gold

Q: We live in an area where we can hike and walk our dogs off-leash, and they love to explore. Unfortunately, it's also an area where rattlesnakes are very common. What can we do to avoid a serious encounter resulting in a rattlesnake bite, and what happens if a bite is not treated immediately?

Rattlesnake Bite Prevention

It's that time again: when adult and baby rattlesnakes begin coming out looking for food. What does that mean for those who live in areas that rattlesnakes also call home? It means keeping an eye on your furry friends to stop them from interacting and even incurring a possible bite. Dogs are naturally curious and will certainly investigate.

Rattlesnake Aversion Training is a highly effective method used to teach a dog to avoid the pain, expense, and possible death that can occur from an unfortunate encounter with a rattlesnake. If left untreated, a bite to the face of a curious dog can be fatal. I have used this training over the years with all of my dogs.

Rattlesnake Aversion Training can be unpleasant to observe but outweighs the cost of medical treatment that can be in the thousands of dollars. This training is a great way to prevent rattlesnake bites for dogs that live in rural areas or anywhere that may be a snake habitat.

This year I used a company named SNAKEOUT, founded by James Molieri. He came to our home and trained our dogs in the backyard. When Molieri arrived, he gloved up and removed the live snakes one at a time to apply a tape muzzle intended to prevent a bite and keep dogs and people safe. The rattlesnakes were placed strategically in our backyard to simulate a habitat in which rattlesnakes may be found. Our curious dogs received a strong vibration or an electrical impulse that was applied promptly to be paired with the dogs' curiosity of the snake. The dogs learned these snakes resulted in an unpleasant consequence and they were to be avoided at all cost. "Leashed snake trained dogs with vigilant owners are safe dogs I always say," said Molieri.

He also gave us many tips on keeping our yard and home safe. According to Molieri, rattlers hunt rodents, and both like to hide in shade, so cutting vegetation off the ground gives them less room to find shelter. Don't leave piles of leaves, wood, or other debris lying around, and don't leave out water sources, such as water for a pet. Molieri calls rock walls "snake condos" and reveals that snakes hiding within the walls won't rattle because they feel so safe. If suddenly threatened, they won't always rattle before striking.

For residents with bird feeders, he suggests cleaning them daily to prevent mice. And snake fencing is a must, at least 3 to 4 feet tall and 8 to 12 inches deep to prevent rodents from digging beneath the fence and providing a path for the snakes.

Molieri said he enjoys debunking the various myths that surround rattlesnakes, one of them being that baby rattlesnakes are more dangerous than adults. "Babies have less venom and they absolutely can regulate," he said. "Also their venom isn't targeted toward humans." Adult venom is targeted toward mammals once they start eating rodents. But rodents are too big for baby snakes, lizards being their main source of nutrition. Although baby venom will still be poisonous to humans, it has yet to develop into the more dangerous adult toxin.

Rattlesnakes of all ages are reluctant to bite since it can take up to two weeks for them to recharge their venom. "When I pull them out of people's yards, sometimes I'll poke them and they might rattle, but they won't strike," Molieri explained. "It's extremely expensive on their body to produce that toxin."

Rattlesnakes will rarely chase humans, being more prone to retreating and only attacking as a last resort. The best way to avoid getting bitten is to watch where you step, especially in the morning. When stepping outside, look under door sills and flower pots, alongside bushes and other shady areas. To protect your pet, Molieri advises poking around the yard before letting them out and not letting them run around unsupervised during hot weather. Rattlesnake venom vaccinations are also a good idea.

Many other local companies provide this type of training around Northern California and Northern Nevada. \checkmark

If so, you will be given a matching gift form to send to NGRR with your donation, and we'll do the rest!

Appreciated Securities

Your gift of long-term, appreciated securities (stocks, mutual funds and bonds) is exempt from capital gains taxes and, in most cases, enables you to obtain a charitable income tax deduction equal to the market value of the securities at the time of transfer, for up to 30% of your adjusted gross income.

Gifts Through Your Estate

For many of us, making a gift through our estate is the most realistic way to make a substantial contribution to NGRR. At the same time, a carefully planned estate gift can reduce or eliminate federal estate taxes, depending upon the size of your estate.

Life Income Gifts

You may be able to make a gift and receive direct financial benefits. Some financial vehicles, such as charitable trusts, can provide you and/or your spouse with an income for life and a charitable income tax deduction as well. These vehicles often pay a rate of return that exceeds money market and CD rates. In addition, they typically help avoid capital gains taxes and reduce estate taxes. Gifts can also be made through your estate while preserving assets for your current needs.

Gifts of Real Estate

You can make a gift of commercial or residential real estate and receive substantial financial benefits. If you give the property outright, you can qualify for a charitable income tax deduction based on the appraised value of the property.
