Sunday, October 10, 2010 was a day that cancer was put on notice. We are mad and we are not going to take it anymore! More than 600 California dog lovers joined together for the 1st annual K9 Cancer Walk in Los Gatos and they raised more than \$80,000 – double our goal – for Morris Animal

Foundation's Canine Cancer Campaign. The campaign funds research to prevent, treat, and ultimately cure cancer in dogs.

Golden Retrievers to the Rescue won the Top Dog contest! We raised almost \$7,000!!! Pat Lynch helped put us over the top with a last minute donation and we could

not have even come close without our own Jo McGrail who raised over \$1,600 all on her own.

The Bay Area Golden Retriever Meetup Group was there along with NGRR alumni to lead the walk. It was a beautiful day for a 2-mile walk around Vesona Lake. When we returned we were treated to a goodie bag that had people talking.

It was good to see lots of yellow bandanas on dogs who





Spotlight on Special Needs Dogs



My Nose Can See Just Fine

Blinded because of neglect. Goldie could have been a regular Golden. Wait – fortunately, nobody told Goldie that she had a special need, other than the need for a second chance. Goldie came to NGRR from Cabo San Lucas, Mexico. She flew into an amazing new life.

Louise & Jim Morris met Goldie at the NGRR Wag-n-Walk. Jill Morgan handed them the leash and they never let go. Getting acquainted was easy, she mixed so well in crowds of dogs and people, followed on leash, enjoyed attention offered her just like any other dog, and behaved much better than some.

The first afternoon home she paced about 2-3 hours, into every corner. When she hit a dead end, she backed out and did not tip anything over. She found a box of balls and removed one, the only thing she picked up all day on her own. We showed her the water dish, twice, and an hour later heard her slurping on her own. On the mischievous side, she did get into some recycled plastic bags, shredding them looking for the groceries. Yes, she is a "Dumpster Diva."

I introduced her to my piano playing, which resulted in wild barking but a day or so later she was sitting by my side on the floor quietly enjoying my playing. Our Goldie is one smart Golden Retriever.

We are identifying a few words that she recognizes: Goldie, come, step, and no bark. There are also several sounds she recognizes like the sound of her leash when we are getting ready for her walk. While walking she has two speeds, brisk and slow, nothing in between. She also drags her front paws and has worn down her claws. The vet thinks that since she has no neck or shoulder problems, the dragging may be her way of reading the walkway for obstructions.

She hops in the van easily and then slides out on her belly off the step. She trusts us that the ground is not too far below as we stay by her side and talk to her.

NGRR would like to thank Jim & Louise for their willingness to take a special needs dog. As is often the case, adopters figure out how truly "special" they really are. With the help of NGRR volunteers, Goldie has found her forever home. It was a long and difficult journey, but with a very happy ending.

Jill Morgan has created and fostered a wonderful relationship with the shelter team in Cabo. Here's a special thank you from them:

From Maggie McLean: I am the foster co-ordiantor here in Cabo and wanted to contact you regarding your adoption of Goldie. When she came into our shelter here we were all very concerned for her. Being blind and older made her chances of adoption here slim but I was not prepared to accept the alternative!! She and Rufus her Golden brother, sat calmly in the run for several months, with no-one interested in either. Finally my home became



free for foster as did another and they started on the road to you!

NGRR came to the rescue as they have many times before, and the rest is history. We are so grateful to Dolores and Jill and the team at NGRR for supporting us and believing in us, and to you both for taking Goldie. We wish you many happy years with her – she deserves the second chance you have given her – thanks so very, very much.



A Few Words from our Goldens ...

Your donations make it possible to turn irresponsible breeders and puppy mills into joy, health, happiness, and love. Hear what our dogs and their new families have to say:

A Big Thank You from SusieQ:

I was saved by NGRR but a few weeks ago, I lived in a puppy mill and it wasn't pretty. My whole purpose, and for all the other Goldens with me, was to be bred to the point of exhaustion – money in the bank for the owners.

When I was 3 years old, NGRR saved me...and I do mean saved with a capital S. I was in horrible condition physically



and worst of all, I had cancer. No one at the puppy mill noticed or cared about the lump in my abdomen, which was eventually diagnosed as a mast cell tumor. Because NGRR rescued me, I'm no longer facing a death sentence. Thanks to the donations of so many caring people, I underwent a surgery that removed the tumor and gave me back my life.

My new family is just the best! I have my own bed and I get to sleep inside. Talk about luxury! In the morning, after breakfast in my OWN bowl, I'm asked, "Do you want to go for a walk?" I can hardly contain myself. I no longer bark at the vision in the mirror because I know it's me...and I like what I see. And here's the best part: I have a family that loves and takes care of me. All day long I keep tabs on them. Every time I show up they smile, talk to me, and pet me. They

throw in a bunch of hugs, too. I love it. I love her. It is all too amazing.

Thank you, NGRR, for giving me a chance at a normal life. I don't understand it but I'm told it's no less than I deserve.

From Miss Sadie's Mom:

Thank you NGRR for all your hard work and dedication to Goldens everywhere who are in some very "low places." When I first met Miss Sadie she was 43 lbs of skin and bones with very dark, hollow eyes and, oh yes, ear infections in both ears as well as a bad case of worms! NGRR made sure that all of Sadie's medical and social needs were properly assessed and taken care of immediately.

My name is Jane Belluomini and I have recently adopted a three-year-old White Retriever female breeder that was rescued

from a Northern California puppy mill. She is an absolute "love." Miss Sadie has gone from a kennel breeder to a pampered member of our family. I am a Reading Specialist at Wagner-Holt Elementary School in Lodi and this will be our 5th year of the PAWS Program. Hopefully, Miss Sadie will complete her obedience training in the fall and begin Therapy

training in late spring. I believe Miss Sadie has just the perfect personality to welcome her students onto a comfy sofa so that they can read their favorite book to her. What a retirement!

We are so lucky to have little Miss Sadie! She last weighed about 48 lbs and her eyes just sparkle with enthusiasm. She's willing and eager to please and I believe she will eventually become an excellent PAWS dog. Sadie and the whole Belluomini family want to Thank You again for being the kind of organization that will 'step up to the plate' and do what needs to be done to truly rescue those pups in need. Any Rescue can hold fund raisers for a good cause and pick up unwanted dogs from the local shelter, but it takes an OUTSTANDING Rescue to be responsible enough to take the extra steps necessary when dealing with the physical

and medical abuse of puppy mills. We are proud to say that we are associated with NGRR!!! Keep up the GREAT work!

I didn't like this and they said that I would get this "dead dog" look in my eyes and shut down and go to a far-away place. And can you believe that I would turn down treats? My mom and dad tell me that I have put on some healthy weight and they can't feel or see my bones sticking out anymore. Now I LOVE to eat, especially out of my own bowl! No more sharing and fighting for food here! All I can say is thank you to those nice people who came to rescue me. Without them, I do not know where I would be today. I now have a chance at a life full of love and puppy happiness and I could not be more content.

Gabe has something to say too . . .

I was riddled with foxtails. I had a big hole in the top of my paw from where one entered and eventually had a big hole in the back of my paw when it exited. I also had to take some medicine to get rid of round worms and giardia. I was really afraid of people coming up to me and touching me in the beginning. I would run away and

Donating to NGRR

Since our organization is staffed entirely by volunteers, every penny of your contribution will help pay for veterinary care, food, and other direct expenses required in our work to rescue and find loving homes for hundreds of Golden Retrievers each year.

Gifts by Check or Credit Card

A gift by check or credit card may be made outright or as a pledge to be fulfilled over a period of up to five years. If you itemize tax deductions, your contribution is fully deductible up to 50% of your adjusted gross income; any excess can be carried forward for up to five additional years. To make a gift by check, simply fill out the donation slip, write your check, and mail to NGRR. To make a gift by credit card, please also tell us the type of credit card, card number, expiration date, and name as it appears on the card.

Payroll Deduction

The simplest (and most painless) way for many of us to manage our gift giving is with an easy payroll deduction. Each year United Way, the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC), and other charitable campaigns give working people the opportunity to allocate payroll deductions or make a one-time contribution at work. Ask your employer for a Donor Option Card to direct your United Way contribution to NGRR.

Matching Gift

Over 6,000 companies encourage their employees' philanthropy through a matching gift program whereby your employer will match your individual donations. This generous program doubles - and sometimes triples - your donation. Ask your human resources department if your employer has such a program. If so, you will be given a matching gift form to send to NGRR with your donation, and we'll do the rest!

Appreciated Securities

Your outright gift of long-term, appreciated securities (stocks, mutual funds and bonds) is exempt from capital gains taxes and, in most cases, enables you to obtain a charitable income tax deduction equal to the market value of the securities at the time of transfer, for up to 30% of your adjusted gross income.

Gifts Through Your Estate

For many of us, making a gift through our estate is the most realistic way to make a substantial contribution to NGRR. At the same time, a carefully planned estate gift can reduce or eliminate federal estate taxes, depending upon the size of vour estate.

Life Income Gifts

You may be able to make a gift and receive direct financial benefits. Some financial vehicles, such as charitable trusts, can provide you and/or your spouse with an income for life and a charitable income tax deduction as well. These vehicles often pay a rate of return that exceeds money market and CD rates. In addition, they typically help avoid capital gains taxes and reduce estate taxes. Gifts can also be made through your estate while preserving assets for your current needs.

Gifts of Real Estate

You can make a gift of commercial or residential real estate and receive substantial financial benefits. If you give the property outright, you can qualify for a charitable income tax deduction based on the appraised value of the property.

Tell NGRR How to Use Your Donation

There are several ways you can direct NGRR to allocate your contribution. You may choose to spread your donation across all funds, or you may tell us to apply all of it to a specific cause.

General Fund

Contributions to this fund will pay for ordinary veterinary care, food, and other expenses directly related to our Goldens in foster care. Any excess monies in this fund are allocated to NGRR's emergency reserve to help cover catastrophic events, such as earthquakes and puppy mill raids, in communities throughout Northern California.

Senior Goldens

Contributions to this fund will be used exclusively to support the extra veterinary and foster care usually required for dogs eight years and older - our well-deserving Golden Oldies.

Special Needs Fund

Inspired by "Zack," a severely dysplastic Golden taken in and treated by NGRR, this fund was established to provide extensive veterinary care, surgery, and rehabilitation to young and deserving Goldens who are critically ill, deformed and/or injured. These dogs need immediate access to funds to restore their quality of life - and, in extreme cases, to save their lives - without financially burdening their adoptive families.

I was scared at first but then I realized that it was just water and I began to run through them chasing the birds with my tail wagging like crazy! There are not enough licks in me to express my gratitude for being saved from the life that I was living. Thanks NGRR!!
