


we decided to get even cuter and come up with two more things for her to enjoy. We thought you might enjoy hearing about them, too.

The Final Chapter in the life of a wonderful NorCal Golden

We'll never forget you, Teddy-Bear

oday I have to give my special buddy, Teddy-Bear, a final hug before he goes to the land of meadows to await my passing to cross the rainbow bridge. I say "my" passing as I know when I do pass, my Teddy-Bear will be among the Goldens, Labs and other special friends who will cross the Rainbow Bridge with me. However, I also know that this very special guy touched several other's lives before mine so indeed he will be carried across the rainbow bridge in the hearts of several whose lives were far richer for having known our Teddy-Bear.

His first chapter is unknown as he was found wandering around Watsonville and was turned over first to the Santa Cruz Humane Society; then to the local pound, who called us. He was quickly adopted to a family with younger children who just loved this wonderful Polar Bear of a Golden. His new family's vet estimated him to be 7-10 years old and his Second Chapter is on the NorCal website (NorCal Success Stories – Teddy).

His final chapter with us began during May of 2005. He had been returned to NorCal from his adoptive family (after, I think, 3-4 years) when that family was breaking up. He came to us as a Sr. NorCal Rescue Golden, at first for only a few days before going on to yet another foster and yet another temporary home.

I picked him up from the K-9 Country Club kennel in Petaluma and planned to keep him over a long Memorial Day weekend until his new foster returned from camping.

I'll never forget when I first saw him. He peeked at me through a doorway when he was coming after being called and stopped to check me out, not in fear but curiosity, before ambling over to meet me and for a hug. As I came to know later, it was he who gave me one and such a big one (as if he knew something before I did) wrapping himself partly around my legs, to my front and looking up to me to

say, "What kept you?"

My first impression was his size – he was so big; his paws resembling those of a bear and his size, gait, color and markings seemed to cry out mix – with a Polar Bear, maybe! However, I was also immediately impressed with his gentleness and his seeming willingness to trust me right from the beginning as he walked out and into my truck (rigged with an easy walk up ramp and comfortable bed for his trip). Before settling down, he came to me at the back of my truck, nuzzled me and put his face against mine. He seemed to be saying "thanks" and it also seemed - with his hug earlier and nuzzling now - that he

really wanted to touch my heart . . . and, of course, he did.

When we arrived home and my wife, Christy, saw him, she, of course, welcomed him into our home, but later commented that he was the saddest looking guy she'd ever seen. Also that he was the biggest dog she'd ever seen – and boy was he!

Although he was originally only going to be with us over a 4-day holiday weekend before going on to another new foster home, I had him examined by my vet due to symptoms of chronic pain and stiffness reported to me by Chris (K-9CC) and that I observed as well. We determined that this gentle giant had great hips but was suffering from degenerative arthritis in his back which caused him – at a minimum – that nearly constant, burning arthritis ache many of us know, coupled with periods of pain and stiffness. My vet and I agreed on a regimen of supplements, antiinflammation meds and exercise to trim him just a bit – although he weighed in at about 112, my vet didn't feel he had a lot of fat to loose and was just one heck of a big bundle of Golden.

Before his "few days" with us (which became 10 days as we were working with our vet and evaluating him) were over, his continued gentleness, trust and the personality that was emerging all touched my heart so that I couldn't think of sending this wonderful, special guy to yet another temporary foster and more unknown future. I decided he would join our family of 2 Goldens and a Black Lab and stay right here with us to share our home and love for his final days —

Little did I know the joy he would bring me over the next few months . . .

Prior to picking him up, my first "introduction" to him was through his "bio" which described him as gentle and loving but also lazy and stubborn. While I knew a good deal of his laziness and stubbornness were from the chronic pain he was suffering, I could also see that if he was in "max-relax" mode, I probably wasn't going to get him moving easily.

Also the first day or so when I took him for a walk to a nearby field for exercise, I wasn't sure he was going to come home with me as he lay down in the grass and clover, lifting his head to sample the morning breezes and seeming to settle in for a power nap.

After my coaxing got little response, I thought I'd just try walking away and see what he would do and, to my surprise, up he came and soon he was at my side, heading for home – of course, the treat in my hand may have helped as he seemed especially skilled at spotting potential for treats and seizing both the moment, and the treater.

He was so smart that he learned to watch for my hand dipping into my pocket and knew that was where the treats were. He'd be quickly at my side waiting for his expected reward whether he had done anything to earn it or not.

Over time, as his pain decreased and as he bonded with us, the wonderfully playful, intelligent, expressive, and sometimes bossy Teddy-Bear emerged more and more. Although he was only named Teddy when he first came to us, we added the -Bear, as his size and surprisingly gentle manner made his full pedigree only naturally Teddy-Bear.

From the first night, he showed that he wanted to be part of our family. As

I was sitting on the floor with my back against the couch, watching TV and enjoying time with Charley, Max and Aspen (our Black Lab and 2 Goldens), Teddy walked over to join us, nuzzling and climbing partway into my lap for a long cuddle and hug. And it was a mutual hug n' cuddle as he was very expressive, smiling and shaking his head – which he did to communicate a variety of things from an enthusiastic "YES!" to "come take me out." His head shake was his way of reaching us with emphasis, while his bark was for other things.

He also loved to wrestle and, as we came to know it, play "the bear."

walks As our became a morning routine for him, he began to enjoy them more and more and soon relished in our time and play. He started out just playing fetch and, at times, almost seemed indifferent to the game. Then I realized that, as soon as I thought he'd lost interest and started for the ball, he'd rush over to get it first. So he

soon grew to enjoy not only chasing after his fuzzy squeaky ball, but joyfully and playfully racing to beat me to the ball and play take-away, keep-away. He also enjoyed my getting down to wrestle with him in the grass – he just loved it.

He loved to take time out from our frolicking with the ball and roll in the grass and would often roll over flat on his back in the best "dead bug" I've ever seen. When in this position, he loved to just lie back, close his eyes and get a gentle belly rub and would soon be

snoring away, laying flat on his back with his huge paws in a relaxed but upright position.

At first, I walked him by himself, to give him more time (as he was pretty slow in the beginning) and to afford him my full attention. After he had grown to enjoy both the walks and his siblings, he trotted into our garage one morning when I was preparing to take Charlie, Max and Aspen out, and he barked and shook his head, obviously stating he was going, too. And he did from then on . . .

While walking both to and from the

field, he would proudly carry his ball (eventually 2), in fact, he often would simply pick them up and head on home, declaring playtime finished and breakfast late. Whether he initiated our return stroll, or simply headed home on call, he always led the way and would lie down and wait on the sidewalk if Aspen or Charlie delayed our return.

He was the most communicative Golden, or dog, I've ever known. That is not to say he constantly barked – he didn't.

But when he did bark, you could tell he had something to say.

His bark varied in pitch depending on what he was saying. It's true!

His bark when he needed help was higher pitched than when he wanted to go out to go potty – his rear legs were a bit weak and he'd sometimes need help getting up from our tile entryway or kitchen floor (both spots where he liked to sleep).

When he wanted to go out for a walk he'd come into the living room and bark and shake his head at me (and that bark was a bit different than the his gotta-go-potty bark). When I

got up he'd bound around with lots of energy and look back over his shoulder with the big grin (as pictured below) and, if I wasn't moving fast enough, shake his head again.

Of course, he had a very distinctive bark when he wanted a treat, and yet another one, when he wanted to cuddle or play – especially when it was time to play "the bear."

He loved to wrestle and play as if he were a vicious bear. All I had to do was growl and say "show me the bear" and he'd get his bear face on and paw at me, encouraging me to do the same. We both loved the game and

rolled on the floor night after night playing it – surrounded by 3 others getting their 2 cents, 4 paws and mouths into the fray.

The most amazing thing was how gentle he was. Of course, he pawed in the classic Golden manner but the difference was his paws were more the size of a bear claw than that of a Golden. He was so huge his paw could do some damage if not for his oh-so-gentle nature. He'd paw gently to be touched and petted. He'd do so to play as well. Often he'd lay at my feet and gently paw me to ask for a pet or to have his ears stroked.

His nose was dry and cracked when he arrived in our home. Although I first used a vitamin A, D&E salve, Christy found a really nice, soothing balm with all safe and natural ingredients. I would gently massage it into his nose 2-3 times daily – he'd hold his head up and close his eyes – just enjoying my gentle touch and the balm.

He tended to be a bit of a night owl on occasion and it was not rare for him to want to go out or play about the time I was thinking about heading for bed. As my days do not start early, I generally took the time and found us out taking a walk at sometimes midnight or later. Of course, when we returned we had to have a snack and some cuddle before settling in – after all, the morning walk and breakfast were not too far off . . .

Always with a senior, you're on borrowed time, but even given that, I guess I knew it was going to be sooner as I observed him needing just a little at first, but over time a bit

more prodding to get going on the morning walks. And he was spending more time sleeping and less playing. I hoped it was just the long wet winter with the rain so bad at times we couldn't even go out for walks. And after all, he was a senior.

He seemed to have a stomach flu for a few days in February, then he got better and seemed to be back to his normal self. He was ok for a while, though still not as active as during the warmer months — all else seemed normal. Then he began losing interest in his meals, just a little at first, but more as time went on. Over a couple of weeks

he seemed to regain, only to once again lose his appetite, which had always been healthy. About mid April, he stopped eating entirely. After trying all kinds of different foods to get him to eat, I discovered he'd only eat if I fed him by hand. He didn't fight me and chewed each bite, but would only do so if I hand fed him.

His Sr. Panel, in February, showed slightly elevated liver and kidney functions, but not so as to be alarmed, and we just made some adjustments to his diet and agreed to retest him in May. Given his symptoms, we tested earlier only to discover his kidney values had shot up, indicating kidney failure, which confirmed his symptoms.

Though I did have hope that his stomach was inflamed from the anti-inflammatory meds he was on, which we could treat. (continued on page 16)





Both have trouble walking and appear to require a hip replacement.


The first patient is examined within the hour, is x-rayed the same day and has a time booked for surgery the following week.



Although we started the treatment, it was for naught and the inevitable loomed once again – confirmed by testing – kidney failure. Even given his seeming to recover and regain both some appetite and activity level the week of April 17th, the following week he lost what he had regained and more and was, obviously, fading slowly.

His time was drawing to a close, if only I could face it.

Which I knew I would have to, as I would not let this gentle giant with his wonderful personality and quiet, unassuming yet

powerful presence suffer from either pain or the loss of dignity that holding on too long would bring.

The last page in this chapter – his last day with us was a cool, breezy day, overcast but not threatening rain – just the kind of weather Teddy-Bear loved. He'd lie on the back stoop and snooze, occasionally lifting his head to sample the air. He'd only move from his favorite spot for a short stroll to get a drink or to come in for a treat or some cuddlin'.

He rested comfortably most of the day, taking just a short walk with me in the morning. About an hour before it was time he seemed to pick up a bit, and when Christy and I knelt down with him he reached out to us,

first to her, then to me as if to say "it's ok, I love you both and it's time for me to go . . . thank you so much."

When we arrived at the vet, I had prearranged for him to take care of Teddy in our Durango, so as to not have to carry him in, etc. In a quiet area behind his practice we prepared to send our friend off. Teddy once again reached out to me, looked me in the eye and gently seemed to mouth words and showed me the bear once more before we held one another close for one last time. As I felt his spirit gently leave his body, my heart cried out in anguish – an anguish we all know and that I will have to endure for some time and overcome, as I've still some care to provide for my Teddy-Bear ... some work I must do for my buddy.

As I prepare his final resting spot today – my last task for him – there is a tremendous emptiness, not only in my heart, but in our home as well.

The lack of his presence is realized for the first time.

Both of us felt it, and my wife was the first to put the feelings into words.

And so, too, the power of the gift he gave us by not just living here but returning our love and becoming a part of our family, even if only for a short time, looms now as an

empty void, yet to be filled with wonderful memories – now only flowing with pain.

My other Goldens (Aspen and Max) and my black Lab (Charley) all feel my pain and stay close trying to comfort me. Aspen has shown an especially profound reaction, staying very close, making unusual gestures of love and nurturing towards me and spending less time resting on her own.

My wife has been trying to help me feel better and to take away my pain – unfortunately, sometimes to an annoying degree. She tries to comfort me by reminding me that I knew I'd have a shorter time to enjoy him, as he was a very Sr. guy when he joined our family.

I know she's only trying to help me feel better, but I'm not

help me feel better, but I'm not sure she understands that the pain I feel (and we all feel in the same situation) is not hers to give or take . . . but is, rather, a product of the strength of the love and bond my Teddy-Bear and I shared.

Our spouse, partner, close friends, etc. really have nothing to do with it and, if they do not share the same bond, can only be there to support us (which she is) but not take away our pain . . .

That will endure in some degree, forever, even after the gift of so many wonderful memories wraps around our heart, the pain always penetrates on occasion.

But the gift of the special love we share with these wonderful creatures of GOLD, at day's end, more than balances all...



Outside" Dogs?

Many potential adopters ask "Is this an 'outside' dog?" Our answer is "Not anymore." We attempt to place dogs with people who understand the need of a dog to be a part of the family. Even thousands of years ago when man and all animals lived "outside," there was a cave or den for shelter, and man and dogs lived in small groups or "packs." The truth is, times have changed but we and the dogs haven't. Both humans and dogs are "pack" animals; we do not tend to be solitary. Domesticated, companion dogs no longer have packs of other dogs to live with, so dogs now need to be members of human families or packs. Furthermore, both people and dogs are "den" animals. This is the reason that dogs can be housebroken. Dogs want shelter in a safe, secure den – your home



- and they want their den to be clean.

Obviously, dogs can be forced to live outside, alone and away from their families. But to force this kind of life on a dog is one of the worst things you can do to him. Such a life goes against a dog's two most basic instincts: the pack and the den. If you have any doubts about these ideas, think of all the whining, barking,

outside. Dogs trying desperately to get their human families attention, and then just giving up to become hyperactive, listless, fearful, or vicious when the stress of enforced solitude becomes too much to cope with.

The rationale given by people who permanently keep their dogs outside is that they will spend time with the pet outside. Even the most well-meaning pet owner does not spend significant time outside, particularly when it is raining or cold. Consequently, under the best circumstances for the outside dog, a bowl of food and water hastily shoved before him, a quick pat given, and his owner, his WORLD, is gone, leaving the animal to spend another 22 or 23 hours alone.

A dog brings you the gifts of steadfast devotion, abiding love, and joyful companionship. Unless you can responsibly accept a dog's offer of these great gifts, please do not get a dog. If you already have a dog, perhaps this article will help you to see things from his point of view, and possibly motivate you to change your relationship with him. A sad, lonely, bewildered dog, kept outside, wondering why he cannot be with his family, brings only sadness and unhappiness to the world.



Donating to NGRR

Since our organization is staffed entirely by volunteers, every penny of your contribution will help pay for veterinary care, food, and other direct expenses required in our work to rescue and find loving homes for hundreds of Golden Retrievers each year.

Gifts by Check or Credit Card

A gift by check or credit card may be made outright or as a pledge to be fulfilled over a period of up to five years. If you itemize tax deductions, your contribution is fully deductible up to 50% of your adjusted gross income; any excess can be carried forward for up to five additional years. To make a gift by check, simply fill out the donation slip, write your check, and mail to NGRR. To make a gift by credit card, please also tell us the type of credit card, card number, expiration date, and name as it appears on the card.

Payroll Deduction

The simplest (and most painless) way for many of us to manage our gift giving is with an easy payroll deduction. Each year United Way, the Combined Federal Campaign (CFC), and other charitable campaigns give working people the opportunity to allocate payroll deductions or make a one-time contribution at work. Ask your employer for a Donor Option Card to direct your United Way contribution to NGRR.

Matching Gift

Over 6,000 companies encourage their employees' philanthropy through a matching gift program whereby your employer will match your individual donations. This generous program doubles – and sometimes triples – your donation. Ask your human

resources department if your employer has such a program. If so, you will be given a matching gift form to send to NGRR with your donation, and we'll do the rest!

Appreciated Securities

Your outright gift of long-term, appreciated securities (stocks, mutual funds and bonds) is exempt from capital gains taxes and, in most cases, enables you to obtain a charitable income tax deduction equal to the market value of the securities at the time of transfer, for up to 30% of your adjusted gross income.

Gifts Through Your Estate

For many of us, making a gift through our estate is the most realistic way to make a substantial contribution to NGRR. At the same time, a carefully planned estate gift can reduce or eliminate federal estate taxes, depending upon the size of your estate.

Life Income Gifts

You may be able to make a gift and receive direct financial benefits. Some financial vehicles, such as charitable trusts, can provide you and/or your spouse with an income for life and a charitable income tax deduction as well. These vehicles often pay a rate of return that exceeds money market and CD rates. In addition, they typically help avoid capital gains taxes and reduce estate taxes. Gifts can also be made through your estate while preserving assets for your current needs.

Gifts of Real Estate

You can make a gift of commercial or residential real estate and receive substantial financial benefits. If you give the property outright, you can qualify for a charitable income tax deduction based on the appraised value of the property.

Tell NGRR How to Use Your Donation

There are several ways you can direct NGRR to allocate your contribution. You may choose to spread your donation across all funds, or you may tell us to apply all of it to a specific cause.

General Fund

Contributions to this fund will pay for ordinary veterinary care, food, and other expenses directly related to our Goldens in foster care. Any excess monies in this fund are allocated to NGRR's emergency reserve to help cover catastrophic events, such as earthquakes and puppy mill raids, in communities throughout Northern California.

Senior Goldens

Contributions to this fund will be used exclusively to support the extra veterinary and foster care usually required for dogs eight years and older – our well-deserving Golden Oldies.

Zack's Fund

Inspired by "Zack," a severely dysplastic Golden taken in and treated by NGRR, this fund was established to provide extensive veterinary care, surgery, and rehabilitation to young and deserving Goldens who are critically ill, deformed and/or injured. These dogs need immediate access to funds to restore their quality of life – and, in extreme cases, to save their lives – without financially burdening their adoptive families.
